Dear Mr. Krombeen:

The Grandville Police Department respectfully submits its 2013 **Annual Report of Police Activities and Statistics**. Total calls for service were 6,480 in 2013 as compared to 6,738 reported in 2012. Total calls for service represents all calls where a police officer responds to an incident but a report may not be needed.

Crime:

Crime statistics for the year 2013 reflect a mixture of increases and decreases in Part One and Part Two crimes as compared to prior years. There were no homicides in 2013. However, there was one Attempt Murder in the city this past year. Ten Criminal Sexual Conduct complaints were made in 2013 as compared to 22 in 2012. The number of unarmed robberies was up from two in 2012 to six in 2013. The City experienced one armed robbery in 2013; the 10 year average is 2.6. Felonious assaults were up from five in 2012 to 10 in 2013. There were 73 reported burglaries in 2013 as compared to 99 in 2012. The most significant increase in 2013 was the number of stolen vehicles; 24 this year and seven in 2012.

Some of the more serious or notable crimes that occurred in the City of Grandville in 2013 include a drug search warrant that was executed on June 26, 2013 in the 3100 block of Broadway. The search warrant and subsequent investigation revealed a large marijuana grow operation that included elaborate watering, fertilizer and exhaust systems. The owner of the grow operation, who was renting space in the building, was a medical marijuana caregiver who was also selling to non-patients. The suspect was taken into custody and the whole operation was confiscated, including equipment valued at \$30,000. One hundred marijuana plants and \$2,000 in cash were also seized.

On August 2, 2013 a male suspect made contact with a sales person at the Fred Meyer Jewelry store located in Rivertown Crossings Mall and requested to see a diamond valued at \$40,000. When the sales person produced the diamond, the suspect took it and fled on foot to a car that was waiting in the parking lot. As of this time no charges have been filed; the investigation continues.

On August 27, 2013 Grandville Officers responded to a report of gunshots being fired in the 3000 block of Chaminade. When the officers arrived on scene, they



learned that a male suspect fired several shots from a handgun at a male victim. The victim was not hit by the gunfire but a home nearby was struck. The suspect fled the scene in an SUV prior to officers arriving. The incident was domestic in nature. After further investigation, the suspect was located and taken into custody. He was charged with

Assault with Intent to Commit Murder. He subsequently pled to Assault with Intent to Commit Great Bodily Harm.

On November 25, 2013 during the middle of the night, an unknown male suspect wearing a ski mask and armed with a handgun entered the Shell gas station



located at 3960 28th Street. The suspect pointed his gun at the cashier and demanded the cash from the cash registers. The suspect fled the scene on foot. Responding officers searched the area with the assistance of a K-9 but were unable to locate the suspect. As of this time the suspect has not been identified.

Missing Person:


On April 14, 2013 Grandville Officers responded to an address on Algonac in reference to a missing woman. The woman was last observed in the early morning hours of April 14 near Indian Mounds and Market Street in the City of Grand Rapids. Two days later kayakers found the body of the missing woman in the water alongside I-196 in the City of Wyoming. An autopsy conducted by the Kent County Medical Examiner's Office determined that the woman died as a result of drowning.

Traffic:

The total number of reported traffic accidents to the Grandville Police Department in 2013 was 752, a 24% increase from the previous year. In 2013 the Michigan State Police investigated 30 accidents on I-196 in the City of Grandville that included one fatality. The number one traffic crash location in the City of Grandville was Rivertown Parkway and Wilson Avenue with a total of 40 in 2013 followed by Canal Avenue and 44th Street with 28. Both of these intersections are consistently at or near the top of crash locations in Grandville year to year.

The number of traffic summons issued in 2013 was 1,735, down from 2,458 the previous year. There were 2,707 traffic verbal warnings given to motorists and 269 parking warnings and summons issued in 2013.

The Grandville Police Department continues to participate in the OHSP (Office of Highway Safety Planning) events during the year such as Click It or Ticket and OWI Enforcement that are advertised in the media in an effort to educate the public to the dangers of not wearing a seat belt and drunk driving.

Collaborative Efforts:

The Grandville Police Department participates in a number of collaborative efforts with other area law enforcement agencies. Working collaboratively allows the law enforcement community to be more effective and efficient in accomplishing various goals and tasks. Listed below are just a few of those efforts that the department participates in:

Grandville Officers, along with several other law enforcement agencies in Kent County, are dispatched by the Kent County Sheriff's Department.

The Grandville Police Department shares a law enforcement records management system from New World Systems with the Wyoming Police Department. We have also contracted with the Wyoming Police Department for the use of their firearms range.

Grandville Police Department detectives attend monthly area detective meetings to discuss crime trends and investigations that they may have in common.

In March 2013, Sergeant Renee Veldman was selected to join the Wyoming Police Department's Crisis Negotiation Team.




The Grandville Police Department continues to assign an officer to K.A.N.E.T (Kent Area Narcotics Enforcement) that has been a very successful combined law enforcement effort since 1989. Drug forfeiture assets have helped fund the purchases of technology and equipment that are utilized by the Grandville Police Department. In 2013 over \$500,000 in assets were seized by K.A.N.E.T. The team currently consists of one sergeant and three deputies from the Kent County Sheriff's Department, one officer from the Grandville Police Department, one officer from Walker and one from East Grand Rapids.



Staffing:



2013 was another significant year in staffing changes for the Grandville Police Department. On March 21, 2013 Officer Noah Farrant was sworn in as a Grandville Police Officer. Noah had worked as a part time officer for the City of Newaygo and later as a full time Deputy with the Ionia County Sheriff's Department. Noah grew up in Grandville and graduated from Grandville High School.



During the month of July 2013 Officer Stan Osmolinski, Officer Robert Vandermolen and Sergeant Ken Rosher retired from service with the Grandville Police Department after long, successful careers.



On July 9, 2013 Officer Heather Marciniak and Officer Alex Niesen were sworn in as the Grandville Police Department's newest officers. Heather previously worked for the City of Muskegon Police Department and Alex worked for the Manistee County Sheriff's Department.



On August 8, 2013 Officer Andy Genuise was promoted to the rank of Sergeant after the completion of a competitive promotional process.

Community Events:

On March 20, 2013 the Grandville and Walker Police Departments, along with the MIP Coalition, participated in a “Good Choices” movie night at Celebration Cinema in Rivertown Crossings Mall. Over 100 Grandville and Kenowa Hills ninth and tenth graders attended the showing of the movie “Oz the Great & Powerful” along with some of their parents. The goal of the MIP Coalition is to educate and raise awareness to the danger of underage drinking and the use of illegal drugs.



The 17th Metro High School Police Academy was held during the week of June 17, 2013. Thirty-five students from several area high schools participated in the program. Deputy Chief Paul Anglim gave the speech at the graduation ceremony. Two of our newest police officers, Noah Farrant and Jonathan Steffes, are former Metro High School Police Academy graduates.



On August 6, 2013 Grandville Officers were involved in the Annual National Night Out event that included a total of six block parties throughout the city.



On August 24, 2013 Grandville Officers participated in the Barnes & Noble Community Day at Rivertown Crossings Mall. Officers Alex Niesen and Andrew Measell read books to the children, showed them basic crime scene forensic techniques and handed out junior badges, coloring books and pencils.



On September 28, 2013, the 16th Annual West Michigan Susan G. Koman Race for the Cure event was held at Rivertown Crossings Mall. There were over 4,000 participants in this year's race that raised thousands of dollars.



On Sunday December 15, 2013, the Grandville and Walker Police Departments, Walmart employees, along with staff and students from the Grandville Public Schools again participated in "Shop with a Cop" at the Walmart store located on Kenowa Avenue. Sixty-seven underprivileged children from various elementary schools in the Grandville School District were able to select Christmas gifts for themselves and family members from the Walmart store. Over \$8,000 was raised to support this event.

Officer Roger Bouma was selected by the Board of Awards to receive the "Police Officer of the Year" award for 2013. During this past year Officer Bouma was assigned to the Support Services Officer position. This position has a wide variety of responsibilities to include property room manager,

court security, police department technology as well as back filling for patrol when needed. Officer Bouma accepted these roles and sought out ways to improve the functioning and efficiency of the police department. Officer Bouma completed an inventory of the property room and a subsequent audit. He implemented the computer bar coding system and developed proper evidence packing procedures that decreased the amount of time an officer spends on this function. Officer Bouma's peers were impressed that he had accomplished all of this with a very positive attitude and a willingness to identify issues and seek out solutions.



Records Clerk Karen Ward was selected by the Board of Awards to receive the "Civilian of the Year" award for 2013. Karen was tasked with overseeing the transition from our paper blue form reports to the New World Records Management System. This project required her to undertake new and varied tasks. She was instrumental in the conversion of police department data from the AS400 to the new system and confirming that it was accurate. The task was very labor intensive and required precision which was demonstrated in the new records management system being certified after three consecutive error-free months of data submission. Karen carried out her responsibilities with great attention to detail and devotion to duty.



Deputy Chief Paul Anglim was selected by the Board of Awards to receive the "Award of Merit" for 2013. Deputy Chief Anglim has elevated the quality of training that the Grandville Police Department receives in many different areas. Deputy Chief Anglim collects statistics and then provides a summary and analysis for the department instructors so that they may tailor the training to recent trends and incidents.

Police training is critical to officer safety and risk management. He is very dedicated and committed to ensuring Grandville Officers have the knowledge and skills to do their jobs well and go home safe after every shift.



Officer Darin Rietman was selected by the Board of Awards to receive the "Life Saving Award". On November 23, 2013 Officer Rietman responded with Grandville Fire Rescue to a difficulty breathing call. Upon arrival he found a female subject to be in full

cardiac arrest. Officer Rietman began chest compressions that allowed Grandville Fire Department Lt. Scott Veldman to set up the Automated External Defibrillator which ultimately delivered a shock to the subject. Lt. Veldman then took over chest compressions while Officer Rietman assembled and applied a bag valve mask to begin ventilations. By the time the ambulance had arrived the patient had a pulse and was breathing on her own. Officer Rietman's skills were instrumental in a successful outcome.



Officer Chad Rosema was selected by the Board of Awards to receive a "Letter of Commendation". During the early morning hours of January 23, 2013 Officer Rosema was on his way home after completion of his shift. He came upon a vehicle that was facing eastbound in the westbound lane. He observed a male and female standing outside

of the vehicle arguing. The female was not wearing a jacket or shoes. Being concerned for the safety of both subjects he stopped, notified the Ottawa County Sheriff's Department Dispatch and placed himself into the middle of a potentially dangerous domestic situation. Officer Rosema separated both parties and gave the female shelter in his personal vehicle. He then stopped the male party from leaving until the Ottawa County Sheriff's Department arrived on scene. The male was subsequently arrested on an outstanding warrant. Officer Rosema's actions likely prevented the situation from escalating to one of violence.



Officer Andrew Measell was selected by the Board of Awards to receive a "Letter of Commendation". Officer Measell was recognized for his ongoing excellence in investigative work and willingness to take a case to its limits as a patrol officer. He has shown what skills can be brought back to the road after rotation from the Detective Bureau that

increases the overall effectiveness of the Grandville Police Department. In several significant cases he went above and beyond the normal expectations of a patrol officer by drafting and obtaining his own search warrants that were instrumental in the investigation of the crimes. He has consistently put forward work that reflects high standards of professionalism and thoroughness.



On February 21, 2013 during a training session, Deputy Chief Paul Anglim was presented with an award from members of the AMR Special Response Team Medics for his efforts in helping develop the Tactical Paramedic program over the past several years. Tactical Paramedics from AMR have been trained to accompany law enforcement officers in a critical incident scene should a medical emergency arise.



On August 8, 2013 Officer Rich Brown was recognized by MADD at an annual awards banquet in Troy, Michigan for his OWI arrests in 2012. He was one of many officers from around the State of Michigan who were honored for their enforcement efforts in combating drunk driving.




On August 22, 2013 Officer Darin Rietman was recognized by OHSP for his creative enforcement techniques during seatbelt enforcement.



On October 8, 2013 the Crime Prevention Association of Michigan named Officer Dave Greco the School Liaison Officer of the Year at an awards banquet that was held at the CPAM conference at the Grand Traverse Resort in Traverse City, Michigan.

Miscellaneous:



Trauma First Aid Kits were purchased and delivered to each Grandville Police Officer that will be a part of their “Go Bags”. The kits consist of a tourniquet, quick clot bandages and other trauma treatment supplies. Officers were trained in the use of the kits.

On February 1, 2013 the New World electronic reporting system went operational. This is the new records database the police department uses.



During the week of March 18, 2013 the Grandville Police Department assisted in the grand opening of Cabela's. Several officers were supplied to patrol the inside of the store and the parking lot. Thousands of people visited the store throughout a record setting week with only two minor medical calls reported on the property.



On May 8, 2013 the Grandville Police Department presented Letters of Appreciation to Walmart management and employee Teresa Degroot for their efforts in supporting the “Shop with a Cop” program for the past ten years.

On December 16, 2013 the IyeTek electronic crash reporting system went operational.

Summation:

We at the Grandville Police Department are pleased with what we have accomplished in 2013. New technologies have been implemented, several new police officers with bright futures have joined our ranks and our community continues to improve and grow. The crime rate in Grandville continues to be relatively low. Grandville has become a destination with all it has to offer. The Grandville Police Department will strive to provide the best service to all who live, work and visit our city.


