Dear Mr. Krombeen:

The Grandville Police Department respectfully submits its 2014 **Annual Report of Police Activities and Statistics**. Total calls for service were 6,762 in 2014 as compared to 6,480 reported in 2013. Total calls for service represents all calls where a police officer responds to an incident but a report may not be needed.

### **Crime:**

Crime statistics for the year 2014 again reflect a mixture of increases and decreases in Part One and Part Two Crimes as compared to prior years. There were no Homicides or Attempt Homicides in 2014. There were a total of 19 Criminal Sexual Conduct complaints made in 2014 as compared to 10 in 2013. Of these complaints, 7 were for Criminal Sexual Conduct First Degree. The City experienced 2 Armed Robberies in 2014; the 10 year average is 2.5. Felonious Assaults were up from 9 in 2013 to 12 in 2014. There were 73 reported Burglaries in 2014, the same as reported in 2013. Fraud complaints increased from 56 in 2013 to 90 in 2014.

Some of the more significant crimes that occurred in the City of Grandville in 2014 include the following:



On 05/09/14 at approximately 10:00 P.M., a male suspect wearing a hooded sweatshirt entered the Admiral Gas Station located at 4315 Chicago Drive. He approached the gas station attendant, displayed a knife and demanded money. The suspect took the cash from the cash register and fled the scene on foot. A K-9 unit from the Grand Rapids Police Department responded and ran a track that was later terminated as they were unable to locate the suspect.

There were several other armed robberies that had occurred in the Kent County area that were similar in nature. The Grandville Detective Bureau learned that a suspect had been arrested in connection to an armed robbery in the City of Sparta. A Grandville Detective responded to the Kent County Jail and conducted

an interview of the suspect. The suspect admitted to the Grandville Detective that he committed the Admiral Gas Station robbery and two other robberies that occurred in the City of Wyoming and the City of Walker. It was also discovered that the suspect had been arrested and convicted of an armed robbery of the Grandville Shell Gas Station in 2003. Armed Robbery charges were obtained against the suspect and the case was forwarded to the Kent County Circuit Court for disposition. The suspect subsequently pleaded guilty to the Armed Robbery charges in Grandville and Sparta.



On 06/19/14 at approximately 11:00 A.M., a male suspect entered a home located in the 3700 block of Prairie Street and attacked the elderly female resident. The suspect sexually assaulted the victim and then took money from her home. The victim was hospitalized due to the injuries she suffered in the attack. The suspect, identified as Shawn Jarrett, was arrested and lodged in the Kent County Jail the following day. In February 2015, Jarrett was found guilty of two counts of Criminal Sexual Conduct in the First Degree and one count of Home Invasion in the First Degree at the conclusion of a weeklong trial in the Kent County 17<sup>th</sup> Circuit Court. Jarrett was also formally charged with the murder of a woman in the City of Walker in 2014.

On 09/14/14 Grandville Officers investigated a criminal sexual conduct complaint that involved a youth pastor from the Grandville Baptist Church on 40<sup>th</sup> Street and a minor female. The youth pastor was charged with Criminal Sexual Conduct in the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Degree. The suspect waived his preliminary exam in the 59<sup>th</sup> District Court and the case was bound over to the 17<sup>th</sup> Circuit Court for disposition. The suspect subsequently pleaded guilty to Criminal Sexual Conduct in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree.



On 10/17/14 officers from the Grandville Police Department, along with members of KANET, responded to a residence in the 3200 block of Olivet Street in reference to a report of a Methamphetamine lab at that location. An active Methamphetamine lab was located at the residence. Drugs, money and a semi truck were seized. Three suspects were charged with various crimes including outstanding warrants, drug charges and Obstructing Justice. CPS responded to the scene as a child was being raised at the residence where the methamphetamine was being produced.



On 12/09/14 Grandville Officers responded to the 4600 block of Wyatt Street in reference to an armed robbery and home invasion that had just occurred. Upon subsequent investigation, it was discovered that one adult male and two juveniles were involved in the incident where the victim was threatened and assaulted over a drug debt. A handgun was displayed by one of the suspects during the incident. The three suspects were located and taken into custody. The suspects were charged with Armed Robbery and Home Invasion.

### **Traffic:**

The total number of reported traffic accidents to the Grandville Police Department in 2014 was 728, a 3.1% decrease from the previous year. The number one traffic crash location in the City of Grandville was 44<sup>th</sup> Street and Canal Avenue with a total of 33 crashes in 2014 followed by 44<sup>th</sup> Street and Ivanrest Avenue with 31. These intersections are at or near the top of the list of crash locations in Grandville year after year.

The number of traffic summons issued in 2014 was 1,961, up from 1,735 in 2013. There were 2,389 traffic verbal warnings given to motorists and 246 parking warnings and summons issued in 2014.

In 2014 there were 3 traffic fatalities on the roadways in the City of Grandville.



On 03/23/14 at approximately 7:15 P.M., an 18 year old male victim from Zeeland died as a result of his injuries sustained in a collision with another vehicle that was operated by a 17 year old girl from Grandville. The accident occurred at the intersection of Rivertown Parkway and Ivanrest Avenue.



On 05/13/14 a male subject in his fifties was traveling westbound on Chicago Drive near Porter Street in a Chevy pickup. For unknown reasons the pickup left the roadway and struck a commercial vehicle that was parked at a business. The driver of the pickup died at the scene as a result of injuries sustained in the crash.

During the evening hours of the Fourth of July, a male subject traveling southbound on Wilson Avenue on a motorcycle was struck by a pickup that ran a

red light while traveling eastbound on Rivertown Parkway. The collision killed the driver of the motorcycle. The male driver of the pickup was charged and convicted of Moving Violation Causing Death.

The Grandville Police Department continues to participate in the OHSP (Office of Highway Safety Planning) events during the year such as Click It or Ticket and OWI Enforcement that are advertised in the media in an effort to educate the public to the dangers of not wearing a seat belt and drunk driving.

### Collaborative Efforts:

The Grandville Police Department continues to participate in a number of collaborative efforts with other area law enforcement agencies. Working collaboratively allows the law enforcement community to be more efficient and cost effective in these days of doing more with less. Listed below are just a few of those efforts that the department participates in:



Grandville Officers, along with several other law enforcement agencies in Kent County, are dispatched by the Kent County Sheriff's Department.



The Grandville Police Department shares a law enforcement records management system from New World Systems with the Wyoming Police Department. We have also contracted with the Wyoming Police Department for the use of their firearms range.

Grandville Police Department detectives attend monthly area detective meetings to discuss crime trends and investigations that they may have in common.



The Grandville Police Department administration meets with administrative and security staff from the Rivertown Crossings Mall once a month to discuss any security concerns, trends, issues or events that may impact the mall, other retail venues, or the city.

The Grandville Police Department is part of the School Safety Group that meets approximately 3 times throughout the year to discuss and focus on school safety issues that are of concern in an effort to take a proactive approach. This group includes several members from various law enforcement agencies and school districts in Kent County.

The Grandville Police Department continues to assign an officer to K.A.N.E.T. (Kent Area Narcotics Enforcement Team) that has been a very successful combined law enforcement effort since 1989. Drug forfeiture assets fund the purchases of technology and equipment that are utilized by the Grandville Police Department. In 2014 over \$500,000 in assets were again seized by K.A.N.E.T. The team currently consists of one lieutenant, who has oversight of the unit, one sergeant and three deputies from the Kent County Sheriff's Department, one officer from the Grandville Police Department, one officer from Walker and one officer from East Grand Rapids.





**KENT METRO HONOR GUARD**



The Grandville Police Department participates in the Kent Metro Honor Guard. The honor guard consists of officers and deputies from several other law enforcement agencies which include GRPD, KWPD, EGRPD, WPD, WYPD, KCSD and GRCC. Each member attends a rigorous 32 hour honor guard school in preparation for this assignment which is voluntary. The

Kent Metro Honor Guard takes part in many special events in Kent County and plays a solemn role at the funerals of fallen law enforcement officers.

### **Staffing:**



In 2014 the Grandville Police Department again experienced many changes in staffing. On 01/06/14 Officer Jon Steffes was sworn in as a Grandville Police Officer. Jon is a graduate of Grandville High School, the Kent Metro Police Academy and the GRCC Police Academy. He had worked as a part time officer for the Spring Lake/Ferrysburg and Fruitport Township Police Departments. Jon follows in the footsteps of his father Joe, who is a Lieutenant with the Wyoming Police Department.



On 06/27/14 Sergeant Dennis Richards retired from the Grandville Police Department after over 30 years of service to the City of Grandville.



On 07/08/14 Officer Rick Neerken retired from the Grandville Police Department after 26 years of service. Rick started his career in the Grandville Police Reserves and then went south to work for the Atlanta, Georgia Police Department. Rick served the majority of his career as a road patrol officer but also had a 2 year assignment to the Detective Bureau. Officer Neerken was a department firearms instructor and a member of the Kent Metro Honor Guard.



On 07/15/14 Officers Stacey Streeter Johnson and Chad Buchholz were sworn in as Grandville's newest police officers. Both Stacey and Chad are very familiar with Grandville as they both grew up and went to High School here. Stacey had previously worked as an officer for the GRPD and Chad as a Deputy for the OCSD.



Upon completion of a competitive testing process, Chris Merryweather was promoted to the rank of Sergeant on 08/07/2014. Chris has been with the Grandville Police Department since 1998. She has served as a road patrol officer and had a multiyear assignment to KANET. Chris was assigned to supervise a road patrol squad.



On 12/02/14 Sergeant Dale Karpowicz retired from the Grandville Police Department after 32 years of service. Dale started his law enforcement career with the Hastings Police Department. Dale served as a Patrol Officer, Road Patrol Sergeant and FTO Supervisor.

## Community Events:

Throughout 2014 the Grandville and Walker Police Departments, along with the Kenowa Hills and Grandville School systems, have continued their involvement in the MIP Coalition. The goal of the MIP Coalition is to educate and raise awareness to the danger of underage drinking and the use of illegal drugs. This has been accomplished in the past to include advertisements on bill boards, good choices movie nights at the Celebration Cinema and White Caps baseball games where students are given tickets to these events. Officers have had educational group discussions with teachers and students. Good Choices wrist bands have been distributed to students and drug test kits have been made available to parents who wish to test their children for suspected drug use. Funding for this program has been obtained by utilization of grants from Network 180 and the Elks.



On 03/05/14 the Grandville Police Department was presented with a \$1500 check from Walmart during the Grand Opening of their Supercenter. The money was used to support the “Shop with a Cop” program in December.



The 18<sup>th</sup> Metro High School Police Academy was held in June, 2014. Twenty seven students from several area high schools participated in the program. The students are schooled in various law enforcement areas which include defensive tactics and criminal law. The students also participate in physical training. The academy allows students to discover if a career in law enforcement is something they might wish to pursue.



On 07/03/14 Sergeant Dale Karpowicz and Officer Rick Neerken played in their last Badges vs. Scholars softball game at Wedgewood Park as Grandville Officers. The Badges were victorious in that game.



On 08/05/14 residents throughout the City of Grandville held several National Night Out block parties to get to know each other better and to raise awareness to be on the lookout for criminal activity.



On 10/30/14 Chief Steere, Deputy Chief Anglim and Officer Greco helped to judge the Pumpkin Carving Contest at Central Elementary.



On Sunday 12/14/14, the Grandville and Walker Police Departments participated in the annual “Shop with a Cop” program at the Walmart store. Close to \$7000 was raised by private donors, Walmart and the Grandville Public Schools for the event. Sixty eight kids from lower income families that attend area elementary schools went with police officers, Grandville teachers and students to select gifts for themselves and family members.

Officer Chad Rosema was selected by the Board of Awards to receive the Grandville **“Police Officer of the Year”** award for 2014. Officer Rosema was recommended by his co-workers for this award based on a summation of a year’s worth of outstanding performance. Highlights of his work include the following:

On 05/12/14 Officer Rosema was dispatched to a peeping tom complaint at Planet Fitness that later drew media attention. Due to his complete and professional investigation he was able to locate physical and video evidence. He developed a suspect and conducted an interview that resulted in a full confession. Subsequently the suspect was successfully prosecuted.

On 06/29/14 Officer Rosema responded to a broadcast of a possible OWI driver that was passed out at an intersection. He was first on the scene and observed a fully loaded revolver on the driver's floor board when he stepped out of the vehicle. Officer Rosema notified other officers on scene of the weapon without alerting the suspect while moving him away from the vehicle. When the suspect was taken into custody he resisted and began fighting. The suspect was secured and the subsequent investigation revealed that the revolver was stolen out of the City of White Cloud.

On 09/20/14 while on patrol, Officer Rosema observed a suspect that was known by previous contacts with local law enforcement to carry weapons. Chad conducted a traffic stop for a speeding violation and requested a back up officer be sent to his location. During the traffic stop the driver was found to be operating the vehicle under the influence of an intoxicating substance and was arrested. During an inventory search of the suspect's vehicle, a loaded .45 caliber handgun was found under the driver's seat. The subsequent investigation revealed that the weapon was stolen out of the City of Grand Rapids.

During 2014 Officer Rosema became a Field Training Officer and fulfilled this responsibility in a professional manner.



Sergeant Andrew Genuise received the **Chief's Award of Excellence** for 2014. Sergeant Genuise in 2014 received 2 Letters of Commendation and received a Unit Commendation for his assistance in investigations of serious crimes. His work as a road patrol supervisor, his leadership and his investigative abilities are exemplary. He received the **"Police Officer of the Year"** award in 2011 for his work ethic, investigative excellence, dedication and professionalism. Andy continues to be the kind of police officer that gets the job done right and who helps set the bar high for his officers.



Sergeant Matt Meeuwsen and Detective Darin Rietman received the **Chief's Award of Excellence**. Matt and Darin were the detectives who were assigned to the primary investigation of the brutal Home Invasion/Criminal Sexual Conduct crime that occurred on Prairie Street in June 2014.

Many people, including officers from other law enforcement agencies, Grandville residents and members of the Grandville Police Department, played an important role that led to the identification, arrest and successful prosecution of a person who was a very dangerous threat to the public. It was also very important that the detectives, who were responsible for the investigation of this heinous crime, document, organize and take charge of all efforts in order to ensure a successful outcome. Through Matt and Darin's efforts, professionalism and dedication, the successful outcome was achieved. They helped show that the Grandville Police Department is a quality law enforcement organization.



On 06/19/14, Grandville officers responded to a home invasion on Prairie Street where the suspect had just fled the scene. Upon arrival, officers discovered that the victim, an elderly female, had also been sexually assaulted and beaten by the suspect. This brutal, heinous crime stunned the community. Within 36 hours the suspect, Shawn Jarrett, was identified and taken into custody. The speed at which the apprehension was made of this very dangerous individual is due to professional investigative and collaborative efforts of all the officers involved

including assistance from numerous other law enforcement agencies and the public. The Board of Awards selected Sergeant Andrew Genuise, Sergeant Dale Karpowicz (Ret.), Sergeant Matthew Meeuwsen, D/Sergeant Renee Veldman, Detective Alex Niesen, Detective Darin Rietman, Officer Roger Bouma, Officer Noah Farrant, Officer Jim Gainey, Officer Andrew Measell, Officer Rick Neerken (Ret.) and Officer Jon Steffes to receive a **Departmental Unit Commendation** for their actions taken in this incident.

On 06/19/14 suspect Shawn Jarrett committed a brutal home invasion and sexual assault in the City of Grandville. Exemplary work was performed by members of the Wyoming Department of Public Safety Forensics Science Unit in the collection, documentation and preservation of evidence in this case. These forensic technicians also gave professional testimony in court proceedings that was crucial in bringing this very dangerous suspect to justice.

In addition to the above mentioned case, the WYDPS FSU helps provide technical support, training and guidance to the Grandville Police Department in the area of forensic science.

WYDPS FSU members Terra Wesseldyk, Todd Masula, Julia Carmody and Wendy Brittain were all selected by the Board of Awards to receive a **Departmental Unit Commendation** for their actions in the support and assistance given to our agency.

During the Grandville Police Department's transition from a paper based records management system to an electronic records management system, members of the Wyoming Department of Public Safety Records Bureau provided us with invaluable assistance in getting the system operational. This came in the form of job shadowing, training and only being a phone call away to help with questions. Their support and dedication were greatly appreciated.

The Board of Awards has selected the Wyoming Department of Public Safety Records Bureau members Betsy Macicak, Cynthia Robinson, Christine Mraihi, Christine Garthe, Shavonne Bridgewater and Paula Asiala to receive a **Departmental Unit Commendation** for their actions in support of the Grandville Police Department.

On 08/21/12 the Grandville Police Department responded to the Holiday Inn Express and took a Larceny from a Motor Vehicle complaint. An off duty MSP Trooper who was staying at the motel had parked his vehicle in the lot which contained several pieces of police related equipment to include his department issued M16 tactical rifle. The rifle, along with other equipment, was stolen from the vehicle by an unknown suspect. Sergeant Chris Merryweather, who was assigned to KANET at the time, worked on tips from various sources in an effort to recover the stolen M16. In February of 2014, Sergeant Merryweather received information on the whereabouts of the stolen rifle. Through her persistence and diligence in the investigation of this complaint, she was able, along with other KANET members, to draft and execute a search warrant that led to the recovery of the stolen rifle in the City of Grand Rapids. Sergeant Merryweather was selected by the Board of Awards to receive a **Letter of Commendation** for her actions in that incident.

On 02/07/14 Sergeant Matt Meeuwsen, who was working as a Detective in the Detective Bureau at the time, was assigned a larceny complaint that had occurred at Planet Fitness, as had several other larceny complaints at that location. Through creative innovativeness and investigation, he developed a suspect. He then disseminated this information to other area law enforcement agencies that also had many similar crimes involving fitness facilities. The suspect and an accomplice were arrested a short time later. Eight Grandville larceny cases were cleared along with many others in Kent County. Sergeant Matt Meeuwsen was selected by the Grandville Board of Awards to receive a **Letter of Commendation** for his actions in this incident.

On 06/19/14 Grandville Officers responded to an address on Prairie Street in response to a home invasion and sexual assault that had just occurred with the suspect having fled the scene. The suspect was quickly identified and taken into custody due to outstanding investigative work performed by members of this department, assistance from other law enforcement agencies and the public. Sergeant Andrew Genuise's efforts were noteworthy as he assisted the Detective Bureau with follow up investigation of this incident. He received information from a witness who believed that she had observed the suspect at 2 different times in the City of Grandville on the day of the incident, both of which revolved around

the Rapid bus line. Sergeant Genuise interviewed the witness and gathered all the facts. He investigated further by contacting the bus station, providing them with a description of the suspect and requested a video search. Upon hearing that the Rapid did have video footage, Sergeant Genuise responded to the bus station to review the video to ascertain that he had the correct footage showing the suspect and his bicycle. A request was made of the Rapid to preserve the video footage for evidentiary purposes. Copies of the video footage were brought back to the Grandville Police Department. The video footage was one of the many pieces of evidence collected that was crucial to the investigation of this incident and successful prosecution of the suspect. Sergeant Genuise was selected by the Board of Awards to receive a **Letter of Commendation** for his actions in this incident.

During the early morning hours of 02/18/14 Sergeant Andrew Genuise noted that he was not feeling well and went to the Grandville fire station to be medically checked out. During the examination it was discovered that he was suffering from the effects of having a high level of carbon monoxide in his system. In spite of feeling very ill he maintained his focus and team orientation. He ordered all on duty officers to be checked for carbon monoxide poisoning as well. They also were discovered to have elevated levels of CO in their system. Sergeant Genuise took additional steps to notify command and call in replacement officers prior to allowing himself to be transported to the hospital for treatment. Sergeant Genuise was selected by the Board of Awards to receive an **Individual Commendation** for the actions he took in this incident.



On 10/17/14 Officers Andrew Measell, Rich Brown and Jim Gainey responded to an address in the north end of the city reference a medical call concerning a male subject. Upon arrival no one would answer the door. The officers were finally allowed entry into the home by a female occupant

who was very evasive but eventually led them to the male subject who was hiding under a sink. While on scene the officers noticed evidence of drug activity and requested consent to search the residence. Upon further investigation it was discovered that there was a methamphetamine lab in the home. Because of the officer's observations, communication and investigative skills, a meth lab was shut down. Officers Measell, Brown and Gainey were selected by the Board of Awards to receive a **Departmental Unit Commendation** for their actions in this incident.



On 12/09/14 Sergeant Andrew Genuise, Officers Rich Brown, Chad Rosema, Andrew Measell, and Chad Buchholz were dispatched to an armed robbery that had just occurred at a residence. Responding officers set up a perimeter around the home and called for a K-9 unit to assist. As

information was received from the victims and witnesses, the officers were able to develop leads and actually determined that one of the initial callers was involved in the robbery. Through collaborative efforts by all the officers on the scene, an operational plan was developed that allowed for the safe apprehension of the three suspects. Sergeant Genuise, Officers Brown, Rosema, Measell and Buchholz were selected by the Board of Awards to receive a **Departmental Unit Commendation** for their actions in this incident.

On the morning of 03/12/14 Officer Jon Steffes and Officer Chad Rosema were dispatched to assist the fire department on a medical call, a possible stroke. Shortly after their arrival the patient coded. Officer Steffes and Firefighter McNutt immediately began CPR and were assisted by paramedics from AMR. After several minutes of resuscitative efforts, with Jon performing chest compressions, the patient regained a pulse and respiratory efforts on her own. Officer Jon Steffes was selected by the Board of Awards to receive a **Life Saving Award** for his actions in this incident.

On 10/13/14 Officer Andrew Measell was dispatched to assist the Grandville Fire Department on a medical call where a subject was having difficulty breathing. The

fire department arrived and advised dispatch that the patient was in cardiac arrest. Officer Measell and Firefighter McNutt immediately began CPR and were assisted by paramedics from AMR. After several minutes of resuscitative efforts with Officer Measell performing chest compressions, the patient regained a pulse and began breathing on her own prior to transport to a hospital. The Board of Awards selected Officer Measell to receive a **Life Saving Award** for his actions on that day.

On 08/14/14 the Ottawa County Sheriff's Department responded to the Brook Meadow Apartments located on Kenowa Avenue in reference to a report of an abduction and armed robbery. The suspect, who was armed with a knife, approached a woman who was seated in her vehicle and forced her to drive to an ATM machine located in the City of Grand Rapids to withdraw money. The suspect fled from the victim's car. During the course of the investigation that was conducted by the OCSD, it was discovered that the suspect had beer in his possession at the time of the robbery. When Sergeant Andrew Genuise heard this information he took the initiative by responding to the nearby Walmart and made contact with store employees. Sergeant Genuise reviewed all of the store receipts of alcohol purchases from the Walmart on the night of the incident. During the investigation Sergeant Genuise did locate a purchase of a type of beer that was similar to what the suspect had in his possession when the robbery in Ottawa County occurred. Andy reviewed the security video from the Walmart that corresponded with that particular purchase. The person making the purchase of the beer matched the clothing and physical description of the armed robbery/abduction suspect. Upon reviewing a copy of the receipt from the purchase of the beer, information specific to the suspect was obtained. The information Sergeant Genuise developed was relayed to the OCSD. This information was instrumental in assisting the OCSD with the identification of the armed robbery/abduction suspect. Within a day of receiving the information, the OCSD was able to locate and arrest the suspect in this incident. Sergeant Genuise was selected by the Board of Awards to receive a **Letter of Commendation** for his actions in this incident.

On 05/09/14 an armed robbery occurred at the Admiral Gas Station located on Chicago Drive. The complaint was assigned to Detective Darin Rietman for follow

up investigation. During the investigation, Detective Rietman learned that the Sparta Police Department had arrested a suspect from an armed robbery that had occurred in their city with a similar fact pattern. Upon obtaining a photograph of the Sparta suspect from the KCSD, Detective Rietman noted that it matched the description of the Admiral Gas Station robbery suspect. Detective Rietman also learned that there had been another recent armed robbery that occurred in Wyoming that was similar in nature. It was discovered that the suspect had been arrested and convicted of an armed robbery of the Shell Gas Station in Grandville in 2003, again with a similar fact pattern. Despite being advised by other detectives that the suspect would not talk to the police, Detective Rietman went to the Kent County Jail and interviewed the suspect. Through diligence and perseverance Detective Rietman not only obtained a confession to the Grandville Admiral Gas Station robbery, but to the Sparta robbery, 2 Wyoming robberies, 1 robbery in the City of Walker and 1 in Hudsonville. The Board of Awards selected Detective Darin Rietman to receive a **Letter of Commendation** for his actions in this incident.

On 09/10/14 Officer Chad Buchholz read a Grand Rapids Police Department Crime Analysis Bulletin that described a vehicle that was wanted in connection with a series of "Airsoft" shootings. Officer Buchholz sent Detective Sergeant Renee Veldman an e-mail informing her that he and his field training officer had recently stopped a similar vehicle. He noted that stickers on the suspect vehicle as reported by a witness to the Grand Rapids incident matched the ones that were on the vehicle that he stopped. A partial license plate description also matched. The information was forwarded to the GRPD. This information assisted GRPD in their investigation that lead to the arrest of the suspects. Officer Buchholz was selected by the Board of Awards to receive a **Letter of Commendation** for his actions in this incident.

During the evening hours of 01/19/14 Officer Heather Marciniak observed a tan Yukon Denali leaving the Grand Buick parking lot. She recognized this vehicle as matching the description of a suspect vehicle from an attempt larceny of rims and tires from Harold Ziegler that had occurred a month before. During a subsequent traffic stop and investigation, evidence was obtained that lead to the arrest of several suspects and cleared up four larcenies of rims and tires and one burglary

in the area. Officer Heather Marciniak was selected by the Board of Awards to receive a **Letter of Commendation** for her actions in this incident.

During 2014 the Grandville Police Department transitioned from a paper UD-10 (accident report) to an electronic UD-10. Through contacts, Officer Troy Pearson discovered that we had the ability of entering templates of our common and complicated intersections into the report system. With this information Troy utilized his time and talents to draw up these intersections for submission to the electronic report vendor. His efforts have saved other officers from having to draw out these intersections on every accident report. The Board of Awards selected Officer Troy Pearson to receive a **Letter of Commendation** for his efforts.

The Grandville Police Honor Guard has represented the department and the City of Grandville since it was formed in 2006. In 2008 the unit was instrumental in helping to establish the Kent Metro Honor Guard which is a group comprised of law enforcement officers from several agencies. The members of the Grandville Honor Guard initially had the distinction of being the smallest group when the Metro was formed but it was consistently one of the groups that participated the most. Their actions bring a positive light to our department and profession as noted in a recent thank you they received after the Line of Duty Funeral of Ingham County Deputy Sheriff Grant Whitaker. The dedicated efforts of our Honor Guard members reflect well on the Grandville Police Department and the City of Grandville.



The Board of Awards has selected Sergeant Matt Meeuwsen, Detective Darin Rietman and Officer Rick Neerken (Ret.) to receive a **Departmental Unit Commendation** for their participation in the activities of the Honor Guard.

**Summation:**

The Grandville Police Department is pleased with the accomplishments we made in 2014. Our goal is to provide a safe environment that lends itself to a higher quality of life for all who live and work in the City of Grandville. Even though law enforcement faces challenges in an ever evolving environment, we will continue to provide the City of Grandville with the best service possible.
