Dear Mr. Krombeen:

The Grandville Police Department respectfully submits its 2012 **Annual Report of Police Activities and Statistics**. Total calls for service were 6,738 representing a 9% decrease from 7,419 reported in 2011. Total calls for service represents all calls where a police officer responds to an incident but a report may not be needed.

**Crime:**

The City of Grandville continues to have a relatively low crime rate. Crime statistics show a slight overall decrease in most Part One and Part Two crimes as compared to 2011. The overall crime rate average over the past 10 years again shows a decrease in 2012. There was one homicide that occurred in the city in 2012. There were 22 Criminal Sexual Assault complaints reported that include First to Fourth Degree. There was one reported Armed Robbery. Over the last ten years, the City of Grandville has averaged 3.4 Armed Robberies per year. There were 189 reported assaults in 2012 which include Felonious, Simple and Stalking. This is a slight decrease from 2011 where 198 assaults were reported. The largest noticeable decrease was in the number of reported larcenies which dropped to 252 this year from 345 in 2011.



The more notable criminal activity that occurred in the City of Grandville during 2012 began when Grandville officers responded in late January to a health club located in the 4200 block of Spartan Industrial Drive regarding a Felonious Assault/Attempt CSC. A female employee had exited the building and was walking towards her parked car when she was approached from behind by an unknown male. The male suspect grabbed her around the neck and threatened her with a knife. He

then attempted to force her into her car. She was able to escape and alert health club members who came to her assistance. The suspect fled on foot. As of this date a suspect has not been identified.



Early in the spring of 2012 there was a sharp increase in the number of home invasions that were reported in the southern portion of the city. Several other jurisdictions in Kent County experienced the same type of activity. Suspects frequently targeted homes where the residents were away on vacation. They would knock on the doors to the residences to determine if anyone was there. If no one answered, the suspect would forcibly enter the home. The unusually warm weather for that time of year may have contributed to the rise in the number of incidents. It is believed that more than one group of suspects were involved area wide.

In late April of 2012, the Grandville Police Department received the first of five Criminal Sexual Conduct complaints involving an adult male volleyball trainer who had sexually assaulted young women at a training facility on 28<sup>th</sup> Street near Ivanrest Avenue. After further investigation, the male trainer was arrested and charged with several counts of Criminal Sexual Conduct Second and Fourth Degree. The suspect pled guilty to Third and Fourth Degree Criminal Sexual Conduct and was sentenced to 2-15 years in prison.

On June 2, 2012, Grandville Officers responded to a church located in the 3700



block of Wilson Avenue SW in reference to a burglary. The suspects forcibly entered the church by breaking out a window. Property worth thousands of dollars was stolen and the interior of the church was extensively damaged. Stolen property from the church was recovered at a home in Grand Rapids and suspects

were identified. The Grand Rapids Police Department charged the suspects with unrelated serious crimes.



During the early morning hours of July 22, 2012, Grandville Officers were dispatched to the Wimbledon Apartments regarding a male subject that had been shot. Upon arrival, officers found the victim to be deceased. After further investigation by Grandville Patrol Officers and Detectives, a suspect was arrested and charged with Second Degree Murder and Felony Firearm. The suspect later pled guilty to the listed charges and was sentenced to eight to forty years in prison for the Second Degree Murder and a mandatory two years in prison for the Felony Firearm.



During the late evening hours of November 22, 2012, Thanksgiving Day, a male suspect approached a male victim in the parking lot of a large retail store located in the 4500 block of Kenowa Avenue SW. The suspect produced a knife and demanded the victim's wallet and car keys which the victim refused to give up. An altercation ensued and the suspect dropped his knife. The suspect retrieved his knife and fled on foot. As of this time, a suspect has not been identified.

### **Traffic:**

The total number of traffic accidents was down 8% in 2012 from the previous year. The number of personal injury accidents in 2012 was 126, a drop from 131 in 2011. Property Damage accidents decreased from 471 in 2011 to 417 in 2012. The number of Hit & Run accidents increased as compared to 2011. The number of traffic summons issued in 2012 was 2,458, down from 2,711 the previous year. Verbal warnings were down by 19% and parking summons were down 25%. There were no traffic fatalities in the City of Grandville in 2012. The number one traffic crash location in the City of Grandville continues to be 44<sup>th</sup> Street SW @ Canal Avenue SW with a total of 25 in 2012.



The Grandville Police Department continues to participate in the OHSP (Office of Highway Safety Planning) events during the year such as Click It or Ticket and OWI Enforcement that are advertised in the media in an effort to educate the public to the dangers of not wearing a seat belt and drunk driving.

### **Collaborative Efforts:**


The Grandville Police Department first assigned an officer to K.A.N.E.T (Kent Area Narcotics Enforcement Team) in 1989. This collaboration has been very successful over the years as drug suppliers have been aggressively pursued, large amounts of illegal drugs have been seized and drug forfeiture assets have helped fund law enforcement efforts. Throughout Kent County, over \$730,000 in assets were seized by K.A.N.E.T. in 2012. Another benefit to having officers rotate through the program is that the knowledge and experience they gain comes back with them when they are re-assigned to the Grandville Police Department as patrol officers and detectives. Several officers that have been assigned to the narcotics unit have been promoted to supervisory or administrative positions throughout the years. The team currently consists of one sergeant and four deputies from the Kent County Sheriff's Department, one officer from the Grandville Police Department, one officer from the Walker Police Department and one from the East Grand Rapids Police Department.



## Staffing:



On July 25, 2012, Grandville Police Chief Dennis Santo retired after twenty two years of service to the City of Grandville. Dennis started with the Grandville Police Department in 1990 as a patrolman. He also worked as a Vice Detective, Patrol Sergeant, and was promoted to Deputy Chief under Chief Vern Snyder in 2001.

Following Chief Santo's retirement, Deputy Chief Dan Steere was promoted to Chief of Police.



Sharon Shelley retired on August 3, 2012 from her part time position as Records Clerk at the Grandville Police Department where she had served since 2007.



On September 28, 2012, Officer Lisa Clockman resigned from the Grandville Police Department. She worked as a Dispatcher, Patrol Officer and most recently as an Administrative Officer whose duties included technical support, property room management and court security. Officer Clockman started her career with the Grandville Police department in 2000.



On October 15, 2012, recently retired Wyoming Police Department Lieutenant Paul Anglim was sworn in as the new Grandville Police Department Deputy Chief of Police. He served with the Wyoming Police Department for twenty seven years. His duties included Patrol Commander, Tactical Response and Event Coordinator. Deputy Chief

Anglim became responsible for the day to day operations of the Grandville Police Department, coordination of training programs, equipment and many other administrative duties.

### **Training:**

The majority of our in house training revolved around the new CAD (Computer Aided Dispatch) and New World RMS (Records Management System). All employees received training on the new complaint reporting and records system for a total of 65 hours.

Other in house training included 43.5 hours of EVOG (Emergency Vehicle Operation Course), 8 hours of Critical Incident Training and smaller blocks of time devoted to Lead Awareness, In the Line of Duty videos and Pursuit, LEOSA (Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act of 2004) and Concealment.

Michigan State Police provided valuable training throughout the year including 46.5 hours of Data Master training to officers. Sergeants received 16.5 hours of Electronic Crash Reporting and clerical personnel received information on LEIN (Law Enforcement Information Network), MICR (Michigan Incident Crime Reporting), State and Federal Firearms Prohibitors and the new APRS (Automated Pistol Registration System).

The Police Department now has a new Accident Investigator and FTO (Field Training Officer). Officer Andrew Measell completed the 200 hours Accident Investigation course thru WMCJTC (West Michigan Criminal Justice Training Center), as well as Grade Crossing and Collision Investigation offered by Operation Life Saver in Kalamazoo. Sgt. Ken Howland completed the 44 hour Dewolf FTO program in Muskegon and will begin using his skills soon. Sgt. Dennis Richards

and Sgt. Ken Rosher completed an Officer Safety Train the Trainer Course in Walker offered by Valor to enable them to train other officers in the area of safety. Officer Matt Meeuwsen is now qualified to teach hand to hand combat having successfully completed the Krav Maga Instructor course in Grand Rapids.

Vice Officer Christine Merryweather received 60 hours of specialized training including Vehicle Contraband Concealment offered by the University of Maryland, Individual and Group Crisis Intervention as well as the U.S. Attorney's Office instruction in Interview and Interrogation. Officer Dave Greco, School Liaison, received four hours of instruction on Work Place Violence presented by the Incident Management Team. He, along with Det. Sgt. Veldman, attended Autism Risk and Safety Management in Greenville sponsored by the Autism Alliance of Michigan. Officer Greco attended the CPAM (Crime Prevention Association of Michigan) Conference in Mt. Pleasant again this year.

Detective Matt Meeuwsen, Officer Darin Rietman, and Officer Chad Rosema completed the Prosecutor recommended and taught instruction on Forensic Child Interviewing. Detective Huizinga went to Berrien Springs for Children Sex Crimes. Elders Law of Michigan also sponsored instruction on Vulnerable Adult Abuse which was attended by Det. Meeuwsen and Officer Rietman. These types of courses are designed to better enable officers to recognize these types of crimes and aid in effectively communicating with victims in crisis.

With computer crimes becoming more prevalent, all three Grandville Detectives were able to attend an eight hour ISEE (Identifying and Seizing Electronic Evidence) course in Wyoming sponsored by NW3C (National White Collar Crime Center). This course focused on computer crimes and identifying and seizing computer evidence.

Officer Roger Bouma attended a 40 hour block of CPTED (Crime Prevention Thru Environmental Design) instruction offered by NICP (National Institute of Crime Prevention)/CPAM in Wyoming. This course focused on preventing crime in both interior and exterior design of new and remodeled structures and covered everything from window placement to tree and shrub height.

## Community Policing:



In May of 2012, Grandville Officer Darin Rietman gave two separate talks to the school faculty at the Grandville and Calvin Christian High Schools concerning illegal drug use and identification. Highlighted was the growing problem of the use of designer drugs such as Spice and K2 and their effects on the human body. These talks were part of the MIP Coalition grant that involved both the Grandville and Walker Police Departments. This effort targets underage drinking and drug use.



On August 7, 2012, the Grandville Police Department participated in the annual National Night Out event. There were five block parties throughout the city that promoted neighborhood awareness and cooperation in efforts to deter criminal activity.



On Sunday December 16, 2012, the Grandville Police Department, Walker Police Department and the Grandville Public Schools participated in "Shop with a Cop" at the Walmart store located on Kenowa Avenue in Grandville. The GHS Homecoming Committee, Grandville Public Elementary Schools and Walmart raised \$3500 for the event. Forty five students from the Grandville Public Elementary Schools were able to select Christmas gifts for themselves and family members.



On June 22, 2012, Chief Dennis Santo gave his last speech at the graduation ceremony of the 16<sup>th</sup> Metro High School Police Academy. The academy, which was held during that week at the Grandville High School, graduated 34 students from several high schools in the Grand Rapids area. Students received instruction in various law enforcement related areas including criminal law, unarmed self defense and physical training.

This included responsibilities in the property room, assisting with the transition into the new RMS system, back filling the short staffed Records Bureau, preparing the department for a LEIN audit and a number of other tasks. Marilynne accomplished this while maintaining a high quality level of work.

## Detective Sergeant Renee Veldman



Sergeant Veldman received the 2012 **Chief's Award of Excellence** as she became responsible for a number of additional duties as a result of an unexpected staffing change. In addition to her duties as the Detective Sergeant she assisted the Administrative Assistant with tasks including responsibilities in the property room and overseeing and coordinating the installation of a new door locking system from SecurAlarm for the entire city.

## Officer David Greco

Officer Greco received the **Individual Commendation** award for his efforts over the past ten years in coordinating logistics, building partnerships and supporting the "Shop with a Cop" program. Officer Greco has worked with the Grandville Public Schools, Walmart and the Walker Police Department in an effort to have disadvantaged elementary age school kids select Christmas gifts for themselves and family members.

Sergeant Ken Howland, Officer Darin Rietman and Officer Jim Gainey

On July 22, 2012, Sergeant Howland and Officers Rietman and Gainey were dispatched to 4220 Wimbledon regarding a shooting that had just occurred. Upon arrival, the officers gained control of a chaotic scene and took a subject into custody. They were informed that a male victim was dead in the apartment and that the suspect was still at large in the area. The suspect was soon located nearby and taken into custody. The firearm used in the crime was also quickly located. The officers assisted in the investigation that ultimately led to a Second Degree Murder guilty plea by the male defendant. All three officers received a **Departmental Unit Citation**.

Sergeant Dale Karpowicz and Sergeant Dennis Richards

In August 2012, Sergeants Karpowicz and Richards were tasked with the planning, staffing and execution of law enforcement on site security and traffic control for the Military Full Honors Funeral of Navy SEAL David Warsen who died in combat operations. The funeral was held at the Mars Hill Church on Fairlanes Avenue in Grandville. Sergeants Karpowicz and Richards developed an action plan and provided a detailed briefing for officers and deputies from several law enforcement agencies that assisted with the funeral. The funeral, which drew intense local media attention, proceeded without incident. Both Sergeant Karpowicz and Sergeant Richards received a **Letter of Commendation** for their efforts.

Detective Dave Huizinga

In April 2012, Detective Huizinga investigated a complaint of Criminal Sexual Conduct that involved an adult male volleyball trainer who had sexually assaulted several young women at a training facility on 28<sup>th</sup> Street SW in Grandville. Based on Detective Huizinga's professional investigation, the suspect ultimately pled

guilty to one count of CSC Third Degree and one count of CSC Fourth Degree. Detective Huizinga received a **Letter of Commendation**.

Officer Rich Brown

On August 1, 2012, Officer Rich Brown was recognized and received an award for his efforts in the area of OWI enforcement while at the MADD 2012 Lifesavers Award Luncheon in Troy, Michigan.

### Miscellaneous:



On September 22, 2012, the 15<sup>th</sup> Annual West Michigan Susan G. Koman Race for the Cure event was held at the Rivertown Crossings Mall. There were approximately 5,000 race participants and the event raised almost \$400,000.



On August 30, 2012, the Grandville Police Department and several other local law enforcement agencies provided site security and traffic control for the funeral of Navy SEAL David Warsen that was held at the Mars Hill Church.

**Summation:**

The City of Grandville and the Grandville Police Department marked a year of change and progress in 2012. The City completed the Streetscape project on Chicago Drive and significant new retail development opened in the south end of town. The police department experienced personnel changes in administration, administrative police officer and civilian positions. Although there has been change, the Grandville Police Department will continue to do its best to protect and serve the City of Grandville and its citizens.
