Dear Mr. Krombeen:

The Grandville Police Department respectfully submits its 2011 **Annual Report of Police Activities and Statistics**. Total calls for service were 7,419, representing a 6.5% decrease from the 7,934 reported in 2010. Total calls for service represents all calls where a police officer responds to an incident but a report may not be needed.

Crime:

The City of Grandville continues to experience a relatively low crime rate. The crime statistics indicate slight to moderate increases and decreases in the various Part One and Part Two crimes compared to last year. The overall crime rate average over the past 10 years indicates a decrease in activity in 2011. There were no homicides; however, there was one Attempt Homicide during the past year. Criminal Sexual Conduct complaints were up slightly in 2011; 21 reported cases this year as compared to 18 last year. The City did not experience any armed robberies in 2011 as compared to 3 in 2010. One hundred ninety eight assaults were reported this year, an increase from the 150 the year before. The most noticeable was the increase in felonious assaults; 16 this year compared to 9 last year. Breaking and entering complaints showed a slight increase from last year totaling 94 incidents for 2011 which is near the 10 year average of 97.

Crimes that occurred in 2011 in the City of Grandville that were more serious in nature and gained media attention include a woman who was the victim of an unarmed robbery that occurred in the parking lot of a large retail store in January. Two female suspects assaulted the victim and took her purse. The victim received serious injuries. The suspects were captured and later convicted of unarmed robbery and are currently serving lengthy prison terms.

In August of 2011 Grandville Officers responded to a residence on Navaho Court in reference to two men that had entered the residence and kidnapped the female resident at knife point with the intent of holding her for ransom. The female victim was able to later escape her captors in a corn field in Allegan County and find help. After further investigation three men, including the victim's ex son-in-law, were arrested and convicted of Kidnapping and Home Invasion.

During the evening hours of August 27, 2011 Grandville Officers responded to a gas station near the intersection of 28th Street and Wilson Avenue in reference to a reported stabbing. A woman who lived in a residence nearby had been stabbed numerous times by her husband. Seriously injured, she fled on foot to the gas station where she encountered an off-duty Grandville Police Officer. The officer exited the gas station and confronted the suspect's husband who had followed his wife and was waiting outside nearby. The suspect was taken into custody by the off-duty officer and responding on-duty Grandville Officers. He was arrested for attempted murder.

Traffic:

The total number of traffic accidents in 2011 was down 3% from 2010. The number of personal injury accidents increased from 101 last year to 132 in 2011. Hit & Run accidents had a 41.3% decrease from last year; 92 in 2010 as compared to 54 in 2011. There was one traffic fatality in the City of Grandville in 2011, which occurred at 44th Street and Ivanrest Avenue. The elderly victim passed away from injuries sustained in the crash approximately three months after the incident. The number of traffic summons issued in 2011 was 2,711, down from 3,312 in

2010. Verbal warnings were also down, 4,484 in 2011 compared to 5,436 in 2010. Parking summons also showed a drop from 828 issued in 2010 to 607 in 2011. The number one crash location was 44th Street @ Canal Avenue with a total of 30 in 2011.

The Grandville Police Department participates in the OHSP (Office of Highway Safety Planning) events that are offered throughout the year such as “Click It or Ticket” and OWI enforcement.




Collaborative Efforts:

The Grandville Police Department is a member of the West Michigan Criminal Justice Training Consortium (WMCJTC). The officers from this department are able to attend valuable training and instruction in a very cost effective manner when utilizing this consortium, which consists of 85 member departments in Western Michigan from Ludington to Berrien Springs.

The Grandville Police Department has had an officer assigned to **K.A.N.E.T.** (Kent Area Narcotics Enforcement Team) since 1989. This unit continues to provide aggressive narcotics enforcement in the Kent County area. The team had another successful year with several large drug seizures and arrests of high level dealers. The team currently consists of one sergeant and four deputies from the Kent County Sheriff's Department, one officer from Walker, one from East Grand Rapids, and one officer from the Grandville Police Department.

The Grandville Police Department has four officers who are part of the Kent Metro Honor Guard. GRPD, KCSD, WYPD, EGRPD, KWPD and WPD all have officers assigned to this unit. The unit drills regularly to maintain proficiency and keep a professional appearance. The Kent Metro Honor Guard participates in special events such as the Healing Fields Memorial for the 9/11 victims that was held at the Cannonsburg Ski Lodge this past September and the Police Memorial in downtown Grand Rapids last May. The unit played a major role in the funeral of Walker Officer Trevor Slot who was killed in the line of duty on October 13, 2011.

Staffing:



Officer Matt Meeuwen was assigned to the Detective Bureau in December 2011 from Road Patrol Duties. He replaces Officer Andrew Measell who completed a successful five year rotation in the Detective Bureau. Officer Measell was returned to a Road Patrol assignment and will be working the morning relief shift.

Training:

For Grandville Police Officers training is an ongoing process that will continue throughout their careers. Officers are updated on criminal laws and procedures that change constantly. Proficiency must be maintained on a regular basis in the use of firearms, precision driving, unarmed self defense and a number of other skills that must be maintained. The classes and instruction that Grandville Officers receive helps to keep them safe and improves their investigative abilities. Training is a good risk management tool that lessens liability to the officers and the City of Grandville.



On two early Sunday mornings in February and March 2011, the Grandville Police Department, in cooperation with the Wyoming Police Department, Rivertown Crossings Public Safety and the 2011 GRCC Criminal Justice class, participated in a Mall Active Shooter training exercise. Instruction for the officers included how to proceed towards and confront an active shooter and deal with civilian casualties. The scenarios were designed to expose the officers to conditions, sights and sounds they might encounter when faced with an actual active shooter in the mall.

Deputy Chief Dan Steere attended two executive management schools in 2011. In the spring of 2011 he attended the New Chiefs School in Okemos that was presented by the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police along with MACNLOW Associates. In the fall of 2011 he attended the Michigan Police Executive Development Seminar in Lewiston, Michigan that was presented by the FBI. These programs taught skills that included labor relations, dealing with the media, executive leadership and ethics to name a few.

Community Policing:

In June the Metro High School Police Academy held its 15th annual class. The academy was held at the Grandville High School with 35 junior and senior high school students from Kent County participating. Police Officers from Grandville, East Grand Rapids, GVSU, Kent County Sheriff, Rockford, Grand Rapids, Walker, MSP and Wyoming again provided instructors and staff for the week. The academy gives the students a chance to see if a career in law enforcement is something they may want to pursue. The students receive instruction in a variety of law enforcement related areas to include criminal law and unarmed self defense along with daily physical training.



The National Night Out event was held on August 2, 2011. Neighbors participated in several block parties located throughout the city. The annual event is held to increase public awareness of criminal activity, learn about crime prevention and give an opportunity for neighbors to get to know each other. The Grandville Police and Fire Departments visited all the parties.



On Sunday December 11, 2011 the Grandville Police Department, in cooperation with the Walker Police Department and the Grandville High School staff and students, participated in Shop with a Cop at the Grandville Walmart. Underprivileged children were selected from local elementary schools and were assisted by police officers, teachers and students in purchasing Christmas gifts for themselves and their family members. Sixty five children purchased over \$7,000 worth of gifts. Walmart, Grandville High School employees and students, the Kellogg Company and private families all donated to this worthy cause.

Officer Andy Genuise



Officer Andy Genuise was selected by the Board of Awards to receive the **“Police Officer of the Year”** award for 2011. During this past year Officer Genuise responded to and assisted in several significant incidents which include a kidnapping complaint and an attempted murder. His investigations are always thorough and complete as are his reports. He is always at work early and prepared to start his shift. Andy is professional in his appearance and attitude towards his duties. He is a self starter and is motivated to always do his best which is reflected in his work. Andy is always willing to go out of his way to assist his peers and supervisors with any tasks they are performing. He is dedicated to the police department and his family. Andy sets the standard for what a Grandville Police Officer should be.

Officer Andy Genuise and Officer Chad Rosema

On June 19, 2011 Officers Rosema and Genuise, fellow officers and Grandville EMS were dispatched to the 4200 block of Kenowa Avenue in reference to a male subject who was trying to hang himself. On arrival both Officer Rosema and Genuise observed that the subject had tied a belt around his neck and was in the process of tying the other end of the belt to a tree limb. After the subject completed tying the other end of the belt to the tree limb, he threw himself out of the tree. Officer Genuise immediately pulled his police vehicle under the tree and assisted Officer Rosema into the tree and gave him a knife to cut the subject’s belt. Officer Rosema climbed up into the tree and cut the belt from around the subject’s neck. The subject was averted from injuring himself and was later transported to a medical facility for psychological evaluation. Both Officer Genuise and Rosema received the **“Meritorious Conduct Medal”** for their actions on that day.

Officer Rich Brown, Officer Chad Rosema, Officer Andy Genuise and Sergeant Ken Roshier

On August 27, 2011 during the evening hours, Officer Rich Brown drove into a gas station on 28th Street while off-duty in plain clothes. As he walked inside the gas station, he was met by a frantic woman who had suffered multiple stabs wounds and was bleeding profusely after being attacked by her husband. Officer Brown was informed by the victim that her husband was outside of the gas station nearby. Officer Brown exited the gas station and without delay or concern for personal safety, confronted the husband who potentially was armed with a knife. The suspect initially did not obey Officer Brown's commands and fled. After a brief foot pursuit, Officer Brown took the suspect into custody and held him at gun point until other Grandville Officers arrived to assist. Sergeant Ken Roshier, Officer Andy Genuise and Officer Chad Rosema assisted in taking the suspect into custody, investigated the incident, interviewed the victim, suspect and witness and processed the crime scene. The entire incident was handled in a professional manner which contributed to the suspect being charged by the Kent County Prosecutor's Office with Assault with Intent to Commit Murder. Officer Rich Brown received the "**Meritorious Conduct Medal**" and Sergeant Roshier and Officers Genuise and Rosema received "**Letters of Commendation**" for their actions on that day.

Sergeant Ken Roshier and Officer Chad Rosema

On March 9, 2011 Sergeant Roshier and Officer Rosema were dispatched to a business alarm at an ophthalmology office on Rivertown Parkway. On arrival they discovered that the business had been broken into. One of the glass doors was broken and burglary tools were located nearby. Upon further investigation a suspect was found to be hiding in the bushes nearby. The suspect was taken into custody and he confessed to the crime. Several thousands of dollars worth of stolen eyeglasses were recovered at the scene. Sergeant Roshier and Officer Rosema each received a "**Letter of Commendation**".

Officer Rich Brown, Officer Chad Rosema and Officer Andy Genuise

On August 9, 2011 Officers Brown, Rosema and Genuise responded to a residence in Grandville in reference to a home invasion and kidnapping that had just occurred. Upon arrival at the scene they conducted the investigation in a professional manner to include the immediate gathering of important information, the protection of the crime scene and the dissemination of the information to area law enforcement agencies. This action aided in the eventual arrest and prosecution of the three suspects. Officer Brown, Rosema and Genuise all received a "**Letter of Commendation**".

Detective Christine Merryweather

Chris was assigned to the Kent Area Narcotics Enforcement team three years ago. During the past three years she has developed into a very capable narcotics investigator. Her peers and supervisors at the Kent County Sheriff's Department have described her as a team player with good work ethics who sees the big picture and is willing to do what is asked. When she is assigned a case she takes charge and ownership of it. K.A.N.E.T. supervisors believe their current high standard and success is what other drug teams aspire to achieve. It has been said that this is in part attributable to her presence in K.A.N.E.T. and the representation of the Grandville Police Department. Detective Christine Merryweather received the "**Individual Commendation**" award for her hard work and service.

Miscellaneous:



Another very successful Susan G. Koman Race for the Cure was held at the Rivertown Crossings Mall on Saturday September 24, 2011. There were approximately 5,200 race participants and the event raised over \$400,000.



The Grandville Police Department, in cooperation with the Walker Police Department, 59th District Court and other partners, participated in a MIP Coalition that is grant funded. This is an effort to raise awareness of the dangers of underage drinking among area middle and high school students and to help them make good choices. In conjunction with the MIP Coalition, a new City of Grandville Host Ordinance was created that holds adults responsible for allowing underage drinking to occur at their residence. An awards banquet was held in the Walker City Hall Council chambers to recognize individuals that supported and were involved in this project.

Summation:

Quality of life and a safe living and working environment are hallmarks of what makes the City of Grandville a desirable place to buy a home, raise a family, open a place of business or visit. Though economic times remain uncertain, the Grandville Police Department's continuing mission is to provide a high level of service to the citizens of Grandville which they have come to know and expect.
