During the fall, a free leaf drop-off is available to Grandville residents. Pick-up service is available with the purchase of Grandville City leaf stickers. Details of the program are outlined below.

FALL LEAF PROGRAM

The City of Grandville will be providing leaf pickup service for residents beginning in November. The program will consist of weekly, curb-side pickup of leaves in bags with a City of Grandville leaf sticker and the provision of a drop-off site for leaves at the Department of Public Works. The following provides details of the leaf program.

CURBSIDE PICKUP: Begins November 13, and ends November 28, 2023

- Monday Pickup: South of Buck Creek
- Tuesday Pickup: North of Buck Creek

LEAVES FOR PICKUP MUST BE PLACED IN PAPER LEAF BAGS with a CITY OF GRANDVILLE leaf sticker affixed to the bag.

City of Grandville leaf stickers may be purchased for \$1.00 each. Residents must provide

their own paper leaf bags. Leaf stickers will be available beginning on September 11, 2023 at the following locations:

- Grandville City Hall ---3195 Wilson Ave.
- Family Fare ------3960 44th Street
- Ivanrest Hardware ----3291 28th Street

LOOSE LEAF DROP OFF HOURS OF OPERATION

Loose leaves may be brought to the City of Grandville Public Works Garage, 4095 White Street, for disposal. The drop off site will be open beginning October 2, through December 21, 2023 depending on weather conditions. Hours of operation: Monday-Saturday 7:30AM-8:00PM.

STREET SWEEPING PROGRAM

Street sweeping plays a critical role in keeping Grandville's streets, water and air clean. The City of Grandville owns one street sweeper which weighs over seven tons and holds an average of four cubic yards of debris in its hopper. The sweeper simultaneously sprays water while its rotating brooms sweep debris and dust up into the unit. The street sweeper covers 68 miles of streets at least twice during the year, at a speed of 1 mile per hour.

Because leaves and tree debris fall onto the streets throughout the year, the city needs your help keeping gutters and storm drains clear.

- Never rake, blow or mow grass or leaves into the street. Doing so is a violation of Grandville City ordinance.
- Do not allow yard waste to go down the storm drain.
- When you clean your yard, clean up the curb area and catch basins too.

This not only creates a more pleasant view in your neighborhood, it also keeps our storm basins clean allowing water to drain away quickly during times of heavy rainfall. Most residents already take these measures to enhance the appearance of their home and yard. Remember - it may be a long time before the street sweeper is back in your area. Show your pride and go the extra mile when cleaning your yard.

WINTER PARKING REGULATIONS

Our winter parking ordinance prohibits parking on the public streets or municipally regulated parking lots between the hours of 2:00 AM and 8:00 AM, from December 1, 2023 - March 31, 2024.

Parking exemptions are issued on a limited basis. A parking exemption will not be issued for inconvenience of moving vehicles. For information on applying for a parking exemption please call the Department of Public Works at 538-1990 or email publicworks@cityofgrandville.com

CLEARING YOUR DRIVEWAY

City Ordinance Sec. 25-168 States:

No snow or ice shall be removed from private property and deposited or left upon any public road or any public sidewalk nor shall snow or ice be plowed into or left upon the property, sidewalk, driveway or parkway of another person.

We hope for a mild winter as we know with heavy snowfall over a long period of time it is hard to find a place to put the snow, but the roadway or the neighbor's property is not the place for blowing your snow. We do our best to keep the streets clear and safe, please help us by blowing your snow onto your own property. Thank you for your cooperation.



Please report potholes within city limits to the Grandville Department of Public Works. We make every effort to respond and fill them as soon as we know they exist.

Freezing temperatures and snowy conditions can cause patched potholes to reoccur without warning. Use care when you see potholes and contact the Department of Public Works so they can be filled or refilled.





The heavy snow forced out by the blade while plowing may cause mailboxes to fall, crack or break. There is no escape from some of the hardships of a Michigan winter, including the toll it takes on our mailboxes.

Although this is inconvenient, we must clean the entire road. We do not replace mailboxes hit by the force of the snow. We appreciate your cooperation and understanding in our efforts to keep our streets clear.

GRANDVILLE CEMETERY

The Grandville Cemetery staff would like to remind you that holiday wreaths and grave blankets are the only decorations allowed on graves from December 1 to April 1. No flowers, cemetery pails or shepherd's hooks are allowed during the winter months.

COMMUNITY WILDLIFE HABITAT

On August 28th, the City Council committed to supporting the Environmental Sustainability Committee in seeking certification of the City as a Community Wildlife Habitat with the National Wildlife Federation. This is exciting! There are just over 300 such communities across the country, and only 8 in Michigan! The planning is just getting underway with much more to share in the coming months.

In the meantime, please consider enrolling your own property in the NWF Garden for Wildlife program. While confirming your own efforts to enhance the community and wildlife, it will also directly support Grandville's certification. The City-wide effort will involve a number of large-scale projects, but will also require many dozens of individual certified gardens. The process is quite simple and can be done all online; simply go to <u>nwf.org/garden</u> for all the details.

Historical Commission

Around the year 1835, new settlers to Grandville, Mr. Godwin and Rev. Ferry, decided they were going to open a general store. Mr. Godwin began to acquire goods and stock them away in his house while they built the new store. However, before that could happen, his house burned down and destroyed everything. Mr. Godwin moved on to homestead in Wyoming (Godwin High School).

After the fire, Rev. Ferry formed a business partnership with Rix Robinson and Nathan Boyton buying up land in Grandville and starting 2 mills.

Rev. Ferry later founded the City of Ferrysburg. Rix went on to become a wealthy Indian Fur Trader and founded the City of Ada.

Nathan Boynton continued working the Grandville Mills and lived on Ivanrest. He was elated when his nephew, James Garfield, was elected 20th President of the United States. Nathan is buried in the Boynton Cemetery on Ivanrest St.
